Workshops

Monday, June 11th 8:30—12:00

Using Technology and Music with Students with Severe Cognitive Challenges as Catalysts for Learning Target Audience: Beginner

Deborah Nelson & Nancy Sholin Patterson

Students with low incidence disabilities, including severe cognitive challenges, present with highly diverse learning and support needs. This session will address many challenges these students face in a school setting, as well as versatile technology tools that provide different types of access and support for the curriculum, movement, behavior, motivation, and beyond. Participants will have opportunities for hands-on experience with featured adapted music technologies currently available through the loan library. We'll explore, develop, and share a wide variety of application and implementation strategies to address the diverse needs of our most challenged students. Resources provided will include information on vendors, tips for devices, websites, materials, equipment, apps, new technology ideas beyond the loan library, and fundraising ideas.

The Relationship Between Vision, Posture and Mobility: Implications for the Pediatric Client

Target Audience: Intermediate—Advanced Teresa Plummer, Ph.D. OTR/L

This course will review intermediate level information related to anatomical and neurological structures and functions of the human body and human performance, particularly visual and postural functions. Understanding the underlying physiology and kinesiology of human movement and posture and vision will afford the participant an opportunity to have a greater comprehension the principles of seating, mobility, power mobility, and assistive technology to promote physical access to the environment. This course will also discuss function and dysfunction from a neurological perspective. Disrupted function of the central and peripheral nervous system can result in various performance problems that may be attributed to loss of voluntary motor control and sensation. Examination of developmental events that impact neurological function will afford participants an opportunity to analyze resultant mobility and seating difficulties of many clients from a neurological perspective. A review of the neuroanatomical and neurophysiological events that underlie performance challenges associated with cerebral palsy, traumatic brain injury, and developmental deficits will be provided.

Evidence Based AAC: Essential Interventions

Target Audience: Beginner Michelle Butler, MS CCC-SLP & Christina Perkins, MA CCC-SLP

All IEP team members have a part to play in the effective instruction of students with Complex Communication Needs. This workshop will offer hands-on opportunities to discover and develop essential, evidence-based intervention strategies. We'll practice using Core Vocabulary, Aided Language Stimulation, and Descriptive Teaching Methods on a variety of AAC systems, low-tech to high -tech. We'll also talk about prompting hierarchies, Bloom's Taxonomy, and presumed competence. For those new to AAC, this workshop will provide foundational information and opportunities to practice essential evidence based intervention strategies. We encourage you to attend with team members.

Teaching Literacy to Complex Learners: A Make & Take

Target Audience: Intermediate—Advanced Cyndi Little, MA SpEd & Stacy Reherman, MA CCC-SLP

The first half of this workshop will examine the research base including instruction using symbolic communication tools during storybook reading, teaching literacy to students with significant disabilities, and strategies for inclusive classrooms. We'll explore book selection and the following intervention strategies for working with students who have complex learning needs: joint attention; pointing; responding nonverbally; making sounds; prompting single words; elicit yes/no responses; combining words (icons); predictable stories; simple story plots; rhyming; agent +action +object; the connection between books and real objects; asking and answering questions; and retelling. For the second half of the training each participant will create an adapted book to take home.

Pediatric Visual Deficits: Evidence Based Screenings, Assessments, and Interventions

Target Audience: Intermediate—Advanced Teresa Plummer, Ph.D OTR/L

Children with motor impairments may not be capable of relying on environmental exploration to learn about their environment and thereby may be deprived of obtaining sensory processing opportunities. Additionally, children who have visual deficits may also have motor impairments. The dependent nature upon visual and motor developmental is an important aspect of pediatric practice to consider. Therefore how they learn about their world may require specific compensation or alteration. This short course will present assessments and interventions including assistive technology for children with visual / motor impairments.

One Student's Trash is Another Student's Treasure: DIY AT Tools and Supports Make & Take

Target Audience: Beginner Hannah Moffitt, M.Ed. & Jamie Olson, OTR/L

With growing needs and smaller budgets, teachers and related service providers are faced with trying to do more with less. In this make and take session, participants will learn to "use whatcha got" to create low tech AT supports using found items or low cost materials to meet diverse student needs.

Getting to Know the Big Three Literacy Products: Create Solutions for Each of Your Students Target Audience: Intermediate—Advanced

Jim Sandstrum, MA CCC-SLP

Free and low cost assistive technology options can be cobbled together with surprising effectiveness. However, they can seldom match the polished experience and features that purpose built products offer. This session will walk through literacy products from the three most prominent companies in this space: Kurzweil, TextHelp and Don Johnston including feature overview and application to classroom activities. Live demonstration and examples will highlight important characteristics of these products and how they may be integrated into classroom activities. Participants will leave the session having identified features, strategies and workflows to support students learning disabilities.
