What is Assistive Technology?

Assistive Technology (AT) is **any** tool, from low to high tech, that helps an individual with disabilities achieve greater independence and ensures access to his or her education. AT includes both products <u>and</u> services.



AT Services

- Evaluating and identifying systems
- Training the student and classroom staff in their use
- Consulting in the classroom or with allied health professionals
